

1 Samuel 9: The First King

Why is this chapter famous? If I skipped a head around a thousand years, we see the Baby Jesus. If we skip backwards, we have God promising the people a savior. A king. The people in the tribe of Israel had followed God for thousands of years from Adam to the Judges of Israel. Eve was told in the very beginning that someone from her line would be that king. This brings us to Judges 21:25 "In those days Israel had no king; everyone did as they saw fit."
