

## **Ecclesiastics 1:1-2**

"The words of the Teacher, son of David, king in Jerusalem: 2 "Meaningless! Meaningless!" says the Teacher. "Utterly meaningless! Everything is meaningless.""

What a way to open a book! Is it doom? Is it ramblings of a mad man? It's like the opening to some suspenseful movie. They begin with the dead person telling their story. We already know who dies. Sometimes we even know who did it. The how, when, where needs to be flushed out. Bring on the suspense. Bring on the story. Who is the teacher? Why is he freaking out? What is meaningless?
