

### Prayer and Wishes Chapter 8 (sane vs insane)

#### Questions for discussion

# 1. Is it insane to pray?

If nothing is there beyond ourselves then don't pray. What happens when people think your weird praying all the time. Why not get a life? Some people say we get plenty of life praying. That this insane world becomes a little saner after prayer. What do you think?

"Is it insane to pray? No, of course not. We should pray far more often than we do. It's a shame that most prayer happens when people are in trouble. Prayer during the good times can be an awesome experience. It's full of praise, thanksgiving, and joy. Troubled prayer has helplessness, crying, and pleading. Who wants that. Imagine ordering food without a clue how to order. There would be pauses, a lot of "ah's", and awkward moments. The server would be annoyed. Then there are Tim's coffee people. No hesitation, I want a large double, double said at the speed of sound. The server is already making it before your finished ordering." Chapter 8, p, 3

### 2. Is wishing insane?

Why wish if it's folklore? What if there is nothing in the well? Maybe a wish is pointing towards hope. We wish for the best. Is it all that crazy to toss a coin in a well. If a shooting star flashes by is it silly to wish? Hope says no, go for it. What do you think?

"If you ask people who they wish too, the answers are all over the board. I have been reading about wishes and it seems the most common answer is good karma. We do it for good intent to shine upon us. We pray and hope God will look kindly upon us. I said in chapter 3 that a professor believed that hope is positively spurred on by wishing. ### 3. Is our sanity relative to our beliefs?

# 5. Can you dis-prove a prayer or wish?

Yet, the men and women in science dream of answers. They long for what the hope for and believe in. What happens when science disproves a theory? Science can't Dis-prove God? How do you Dis-prove the unseen? Can you dis-prove a prayer or a wish? It's insane to try. What a waste of time." Chapter 8, p, 10

# 6. It's not crazy to look beyond ourselves.
