

Ruth

Ruth 3:9 "Who are you?" he asked. "I am your servant Ruth," she replied. "Spread the corner of your garment over me, for you are a kinsman-redeemer."

One of the main themes of God is the remnant. Throughout Biblical history God has made a way back to him. Adam and Eve left the garden but their descendants were promised to prevail over the serpent. Think about it. David was the last to be presented to Samuel. Moses was hidden in the reeds. Hilkiah found the book of the Law hidden in the temple. Rahab was spared. Narrative
