I was going to put this chapter after the discussion on prayer and wishes. It made sense at the time, we should talk about wishing and praying first. Then, in studying different religions and folk stories, I realized that there was a common theme. People use prayer and wishes to contact something greater. The belief in the spiritual seems to drive wishes and prayer.

Again, I was asking the question: maybe if we see wishes as they are it would make sense. The same could be said of prayer. Yet, I keep coming back to who we wish and pray to. People of the past, present, and in different cultures, all seek something greater. That settled it for me. We need to dive into the greater. What or who is that?

It makes sense to talk about who we wish or pray to first. Yet, there is a nagging feeling deep inside me that said no. To that thought, maybe we should pause just for a second. In understanding a wish, we need to think about it. Wishing in the ancient world is different than today. Prayer in the ancient world is similar to today, but somehow different. I then began to think that what we wish or pray to might have changed also. A prayer or a wish might be intended to accomplish different goals than in times past.

There are questions. Did the way ancient people prayed still hold value today? Do wishes mean the same thing today as they did hundreds of years ago? Historical cultures were mostly agrarian in nature. There was little to no technology. To ask for help from something greater made sense. They did not have many of the material things we now take for granted like cell phones and the internet. They relied on weather and seasons far more than we do today. When you have little, something greater might help. A God or Spirit possibly.

The mind is everything. What you think you become- Buddha

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It does not mean they were backwards or less than us. Today, we rely on companies, stock markets, and industry to make our lives livable. To need a God seems distant. We need Apple and Microsoft more than God. Why wish if I can gamble or find it on the internet. Wishing and praying seem like distant beliefs. Yet, I know people strive for something greater. The belief in the mystical and spiritual run deep within us. It's so true because astrology is big business. Tarot card reading is very popular. Even angels and evil things are popular culture. However, we're not becoming the atheists people had projected. We may seem advanced, but our belief in the spiritual and mystical is very much alive.

We laugh at the past and all their silly backward ways. Yet, they would probably be astounded at our reliance on corporations. Through history everything has a shelf life. Cultures and governments fall. We all know that people fail. Religions seem to disappoint. Movements, events, and powerful moments in time wither away as the clock ticks by. I am reading this book about habits. The writer is making reference to the Rosa Parks incident in Montgomery Alabama. Ms. Parks refused to move from her seat on a racially segregated public bus. The authorities arrested her. In that moment, the civil liberties movement began. America has never been the same since.

A young Pastor named Martin Luther King Jr. was asked to help keep the peace and head up the racial plight of the African American. He wondered in that moment how this movement could sustain itself. He believed in peaceful demonstrations and responsible talk. He was right. Peaceful demonstrations are better. Yet, over the long haul that was not what has happened. Since that moment, there have been dozens of peaceful marches and equally dozens of riots. Today, America has racial freedom, yet the strife, discord, and a gulf between racial lines seems like a Grand Canyon. The movement won, but I fear people have forgotten why.

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This brings me back to something greater. Martin Luther King Jr. hoped this movement would become something greater, yet today it's an utter failure in many ways. Violence and racial dived permeate America like a tinder box waiting to explode. The other side is Jesus. That pastor believed that if we acted like Jesus towards our problems, things would work out. It's true that if we believe in the teachings of Jesus there is a chance. However, if we just believe in the ideals of a movement and never act, then all hell could break lose.

The best laid plans of mice and men often go awry-Robert Burns

I believe that something greater is the key. Our plans are for peace. Our plans are for a happy life. Great plans are made to help things go well. Then we have mice and men so to speak. People tend to screw things up with pride, overconfidence, anger, and malice. A prayer s nice. A wish is good. Yet, actions speak louder than words. Rosa Parks decided on action. It's interesting that people put trust in a movement. These days we have the #metoo hash tag. Racial divide still exists almost 70 years after that bus ride. How long will *me-too* last? I feel we need something greater.

I can bet that most of us feel that something greater like a God or guardian angel should be companionate, nice, and kind. Something greater than ourselves should act better than us. We hope for that and seek for that in prayer and wishes. Happiness and peace need a wish to come true. On its own, peace and happiness seem to flounder. We pray because life is harsh at times. Relief seems like a miracle when it happens.

Wishing and praying is probably the major avenue we use in seeking help from something greater. This is how we call out in desperation to something greater. There is no doubt that we seek help. Why do gambling, psychics, and prophesy make so much money. People still

want relief. We somehow believe that life should not be this hard. So, we pray and wish. We humbly get on our knees or drop coins in a well. I see it, yet, I also see us relying on false Gods and spirits to provide. Our vision of who we wish and pray to are different than in centuries past. We have forgotten who the greater is. There is disconnect today, yet the coins and knees keep dropping.

I thought deeply about wishing. I thought deeply about prayer. Then it hit me. Should we attach them to spirits, idols or Gods? Are they just a form of hope? I was reading explanations of Buddhism, Hinduism, Islam, and Christianity. They all pray. There are no wishes. There is however, deep solitude of reflection in each one. They say that Hindu and Buddhism focus on the inside. I suppose Christianity and Islam do too. The difference seems to be: who are we focusing on? Ourselves or something greater?

It's ironic to me that we pray for things. We rely on a wide spectrum of things from credit cards to the information on the internet. Then I hear the prayers. So, few people really rely on God. I can't imagine that wishing wells have as many coins in them as they used to. I find it ironic because the things we rely on these days have fallen. God is still there in the shadows waiting. We wish and pray but not to him most of the time. It's all seems to be lip service.

We also wish for stuff. In the four major religions, it's not that way at all. Yes, God provides. Yes, we can pray to him. Yet, we are also encouraged to reflect on our own inner being. We are to reject personal gain, and focus on the will of the God. The basic pillars of religion are respect, charity, humbleness, and compassion. It would not take a rocket scientist to see that is not the religion we know today. We look to ideology and the corporate model far more

than what God really wants. I feel we are far removed from knowing God and knowing ourselves.

I do feel we are disconnected from what a wish and prayer were in history. What the 1st century saw in God might look different in the 21st. How we approach the spiritual has change over time. That means our view of prayer and wishes may have changed as well. How we see life today is different than in other periods of time. We have become individual people rather than community oriented.

Recently we have become more socially conscious. In the past, people were communal and tribal. It's also clear that different cultures treat life and Gods differently. To pray in Canada looks different than in Indonesia. A wish is probably not as valued in America as it is in Europe. Yet, we do take some time to pray and wish when the need arises. Why? No matter the time period or culture, people believe in something greater than themselves.

I'll admit, as a Christian this topic gives me shivers. It makes me queasy. Am I being deceived? Am I easily manipulated? I believe in God but some parts of our ancient history are odd. People have believed in spirits for a very long time. I agree that old cultures did not have atheists. It was more real back then. Today God is in the shadows. We don't feel the need to pray or wish as we once did. Were they over focused or are we under focused? Between our ancestors and todays culture: who is right?

I can see the argument that we have gods to explain the unknown. In ancient times we prayed to a sun or moon god. There are sea gods and water nymphs. I read a bunch of information on European spirits. Do you think it's odd that cultures all over the world have spirits and Gods? Cultures that never met, have similar looking spirits and similar acting gods.

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How is that possible? Our modern Gods have the resemblance of ancient deities. What is going on?

It would be very easy for intelligent men and women to reject the spiritual. Obviously, sun gods are silly. The sun is a celestial sphere that works a certain way. Duh. The oceans don't have krakens and mermaids. Well, I've never heard of them being discovered. Yet, men of the sea fear the oceans. Fear it because of its unpredictable power.
